STORY OF MINOR HOME REPAIR YS

One of the biggest places of impact for me came from working with Ms. T and her roommate to build a monster 60 foot wheelchair ramp. Planning and estimating it stretched my mind a lot, and that's coming from someone who is going to college for construction. It took a whole lot of effort to come up with the best and most efficient use of materials that got us the ramp we needed, and Allie and I went through a number of revisions before we found the right layout. The project continued through all three weeks of camp at Baker Mountain, and work was also graciously supplemented by some of the staff at Cumberland Pines. It was pretty awesome to get to see each YRG build off of the work of the previous. Talking with Ms. T each week of camp was a treat. I learned a great deal about her life and what plans she had for it. She was a selfless person. One of the days we were talking about cultivating passion at daybreak. I talked about a passion project of mine and asked the YRG if they had any. One of the campers asked Ms. T if she had any passion projects. She started going on and on about a dream she had of getting more space in front of her house built so she could refinish furniture. You could hear the excitement in the way she talked about the prospect of her getting an opportunity to do something she loved and get an income out of it. That showed me the impact of the work we do at Mountain T.O.P.

It was definitely difficult work, but the ramp turned out really well. I felt a massive wave of satisfaction and relief when I received pictures of the finished product. Unfortunately, Ms. T passed away less than a week after the ramp was finished. I was devastated hearing that news. Seeing the goals someone has for their life get dashed by death is something that will never get easier for me to stomach. She thanked us for our work often, but even if she never had I could see her appreciation in how she immediately started to take care of the ramp. As soon as the ramp had decking put on, she started decorating it with lawn chairs and plants. It was by no means easy to experience, but I'm thankful that God put everyone related to that ramp in my life.

I was deeply impacted by a little boy named Carson. His parents are deaf, and he has the ability to hear. Carson's parents invited me into their home without question. Even though we had to communicate a lot through writing, they accepted me as one of their own. I felt at home.

If you know anything about Day Camp, you know it can get loud! I often found Carson wandering from the crowd because he had not been used to a loud environment. He always participated in the activities; he just liked to do it by himself. There was a volunteer named Dan who wanted to be with Carson. Dan and I were slowly trying to build a relationship with Carson to help him feel more comfortable at Day Camp, and we did just that. Carson was one of the most outgoing and involved kids we had by the end of the week.

I was so grateful knowing that I had a hand in helping Carson discover his place at Day Camp. I just think it's cool because I know it is something Mountain T.O.P. strives to do. I had many campers tell me how impactful and inspiring Carson was to them, and it is something that generally makes my heart feel warm and fuzzy. Because of the generosity of Dan, Carson and his sister were able to attend another week of Day Camp. Both of these kids perfectly embraced what a loving home is in my eyes. I hope Carson and his family received the same love that they showed me last summer. I am daily inspired by all of the incredible families I met during the summer of 2023.

THE HOUSING SUMMIT

In September Mountain T.O.P. hosted the Housing Summit over two days. Building on the momentum of the first summit held the previous year, the 2023 summit included virtual and in person sessions that brough together regional leaders from across South Central Appalachia to center housing in the conversation of community development and social drivers of health.

What we learned

- Housing affordability and energy efficient design must go together. This is a point for both affordable housing developers and those who fund housing: we must let go of the dysfunctional idea that cheaper is better or that we must produce the maximum number of units for the dollars we have...which pressures those seeking funding to build to a lower energy standard. We must consider total cost of ownership and environmental impact, and we must make better decisions considering those most negatively impacted by the affordability vs efficiency debate.
- Innovation in housing affordability is alive and well, at least among the organizations at the summit. Though we didn't find the magic answer to solve our chronic housing situation, we inspired more collaboration and hope for folks working in some of the most difficult sectors of social services. Bonus: one of the most innovative answers to keeping our housing stock affordable is to make necessary home repairs and improvements. MTOP is at the head of this innovation.
- Advocacy works. Tennessee affordable housing developers will soon see an influx of millions of dollars as the state will be allocating 10M to a network of partners led by the Federation of Appalachian Housing Enterprises dedicated to workforce housing. This is just one small example of how a concerted advocacy effort results in a huge payout.

WORKING WITH MR. AND MRS. D.

STORIES OF MAJOR HOME REPAIR AIM

Before the end of the first Adults In Ministry weekend, Mr. and Mrs. D. welcomed us into their family. MTOP was called to their home to address a leaky roof and an unsafe kitchen floor. Like many folks living in rural areas, Mr. D. has spent his life fixing things, but health concerns had caused him to slow way down in the recent years.

\$3,523 in short and long term impact in just one weekend to the D.'s household. Mr. and Mrs. D. have traveled and lived in many places around the country and decided to settle right here in Grundy County. Because of necessary repairs to keep their home safe and healthy, they will be able to age in place in their home. This is good news to their young grandson who lives nearby and loves spending time with Mr. D. working on hot rods.

2023 NEW HOME BUILD REPORT

In the fall of 2023, MTOP officially entered into a partnership with Grundy County High School's Career Technical Education department to build a small footprint home. This was the culmination of a 5 year dream of MTOP to re-enter the affordable home development, addressing a long standing gap in the housing spectrum.





The goal of this project is to address two pressing chronic conditions on the Plateau - lack of affordable housing and holistic youth workforce development in the construction trades by building a small footprint home.

2023 NEW HOME BUILD REPORT

Building upon a relationship between the Rotarians of the Plateau and a bed building nonprofit, an idea was launched to expand the true-to-life construction experience in the classroom. We believe that this experiment of marrying affordable housing with high school workforce attainment is an innovative approach to address both chronic concerns, weaving together philanthropy, reinvestment, and volunteer labor.
